Children and staff members should be encouraged to wash their hands frequently. Children & staff will use paper towels to dry their hands. 			<ul> <li>An enhanced cleaning schedule must be implemented that includes furniture, surfaces, and children's toys and equipment.</li> <li>Communal area touch points, such as door handles, light switches, handrails, and hand washing facilities must be cleaned and sanitised regularly.</li> <li>All waste must be disposed of in a hygienic and safe manner. Tissues must be immediately disposed of.</li> <li>All items within the setting requiring laundering must be washed on a high setting.</li> <li>Items such as towels will not be used, and bedding must not be shared by children.</li> <li>Children should be supported in age appropriate ways to understand the steps they can take to keep themselves safe including regular hand washing and sneezing into a tissue.</li> </ul>	
Health & Safety & Risk Assessments	Spread of COVID19, infections, diseases, accidents etc.	Staff & children	All activity should be risk assessed and due consideration given to any adaptations to usual practice. Learning experiences involving materials which are not easily washable (such as malleable materials) will be risk assessed and may be reintroduced if the risks can be managed effectively.	Activities should be organised to allow as much space as possible between children and staff (including mealtimes)

PPE	Spread of infection	Staff, children & parents	Government guidance is that PPE is not required for general use in early years settings to protect against COVID- 19 transmission. Parents must wear a face covering if entering the nursery lobby during drop-off and collection of their children <u>and</u> if a distance of 2 metres between parent and member of staff cannot be maintained. Staff supporting children and families at drop off and pick-up times must wear a face covering during this time if a distance of 2 metres between parent and member of staff cannot be maintained. Where staff request PPE, they must adhere to the guidance on safe use and removal of masks. PPE should continue to be worn as normal for nappy changing and the administration of first aid. Staff who work in more than one setting (eg agency / supply staff) must complete a risk assessment at the commencement of each work placement: this may result in needing to wear a face covering whilst working. 			<ul> <li>are in place to minimise the impact of any shortages of supplies. The setting will not be able to operate safely without essential supplies required for ensuring infection control.</li> <li>A monitoring system for the usage of PPE is essential to ensure that a supply of stock is available to all who require it as and when required to meet the operational needs of the setting.</li> <li>Other options may be considered, such as the use of washable items. These items will be washed at a high temperature and separate to any other nursery washing.</li> <li>In the case the supply of food is interrupted, procedures must be implemented to ensure the appropriate food alternatives are sourced, and normal food safety and hygiene processes are followed.</li> </ul>	Each nursery to maintain its own supply of PPE and cleaning essentials to prevent the need to travel to and enter a different setting.

This may be achieved through a range of strategies including the staggering of breaks and subdivision of spaces allocated to team breaks.</li> <li>Staff members should avoid physical contact with each other including handshakes, hugs etc.</li> <li>Where possible, meetings and training sessions should be conducted through virtual conferencing.</li> <li>Where possible access to the kitchen should be limited to the cook.</li> <li>Staff should wear face coverings when moving around different areas of the nursery when the reason for moving is not as part of a child-based activity (eg to access laundry room / staff room / office)</li> </ul>	Emergency revisions to the EYFS have been implemented which provides some flexibility on ratios and qualifications to support this where possible. Staff shift patterns may be revised to prevent/reduce the need for lunch breaks by implementing a shorter working day when staff are in contact with children. Identify one other person per team who can access the kitchen at times when cook is not present.
